- The Institution is committed to providing a working and learning environment that is free from drug and alcohol use, discrimination, and/or sexual misconduct including dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking.
- Violations may include disciplinary action up to and including dismissal from school, termination from employment, and legal prosecution.







- The Clery Act of 1990 requires the following:
 - Publishing an Annual Security Report (ASR)
 - Maintaining a crime log with crime statistics
 - Issuing timely warnings

- The Violence Against Women Act of 1994 is a comprehensive legislative package designed to improved responses and to increase the services for victims and survivors of:
- domestic violence
- sexual assault
- dating violence
- stalking

• Definitions:

- Dating Violence Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim, where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship; and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.
- Domestic Violence A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by a current or
 former spouse or intimate partner of the victim, a person with whom a victim shares a child
 in common, a person who is cohabitating with, or has cohabitated with, the victim as a
 spouse or intimate partner, a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the
 domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred
 or any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's
 acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of
 violence occurred.







- Sexual Assault Means an offense that meets the definition of rape, fondling, incest, or statutory
 rape as used in the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program.
- Stalking Means engaging in a course of conduct (two or more acts) directed at a specific
 person that would cause a reasonable person to –fear for his or her safety or the safety of
 others; or suffer substantial emotional distress. Course of conduct includes but is not limited to
 acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly or through third parties, by any action, method,
 device or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a
 person or interferes with a person's property.







Consent - "Without consent" includes any of the following:

- (a) The victim is coerced by the immediate use or threatened use of force against a person or property.
- (b) The victim is incapable of consent by reason of mental disorder, mental defect, drugs, alcohol, sleep or any other similar impairment of cognition and such condition is known or should have reasonably been known to the defendant. For purposes of this subdivision, "mental defect" means the victim is unable to comprehend the distinctively sexual nature of the conduct or is incapable of understanding or exercising the right to refuse to engage in the conduct with another.
- (c) The victim is intentionally deceived as to the nature of the act.
- (d) The victim is intentionally deceived to erroneously believe that the person is the victim's spouse.

Arizona Revised Statues § 13-1401(5)







• Consent – is an affirmative consent standard in the determination of whether consent was given by both parties to sexual activity. Affirmative consent mean affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. It is the responsibility of each person involved in the sexual activity to ensure that he or she has the affirmative consent of the other or others to engage in sexual activity. Lack of protest, resistance, or silence does not mean consent. Affirmative consent must be ongoing throughout a sexual activity and can be revoked at any time. The existence of a dating relationship between the persons involved, or the fact of past sexual relations between them, should never by itself be assumed to be an indicator of consent.

California Education Code § 67386







Consent – "Consent" means intelligent, knowing, and voluntary consent and does not include coerced submission. "Consent" shall not be deemed or construed to mean the failure by the alleged victim to offer physical resistance to the offender.

Florida Statute § 794.011

Consent is not specifically defined under Georgia law.

Consent - "Consent" means assent in fact, whether express or apparent.

Reporting:

- The Institution encourages accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to the Campus Security Authority (CSA) and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
- A CSA is any school official that has a significant responsibility for students and/or school activities. The Institution has designated the school's Campus President/Executive Director as the CSA. The secondary CSA is the Associate Director or Director of Education.







Risk Reduction:

- Buddy system
- Walk with a trusted friend, rather than alone, to the bus stop.
- Be aware of your surroundings avoid isolated areas
- Avoid dark and/or deserted streets and alleyways where a call for help may go unheard.
- Carry a cell phone
- Trust your instincts
- Leave immediately if a situation or location feels unsafe
- Walk with a purpose
- A quick, confident stride may keep criminals at bay.







Bystander Intervention:

- Prevent harm or safely intervene when there is a risk of violence
- Re-directing individuals to a safe place
- Avoid peer pressure and inappropriate jokes
- Don't encourage friends to drink excessively or engage in promiscuous behavior
- Encourage victims to report crime
- Listen, be patient and refrain from making judgements
